The road towards sustainability and integration

The Covid-19 pandemic has highlighted the need for governments to prioritize health as a strategic investment. Healthcare systems in both OECD and non-OECD economies are facing increasing funding pressures to address both non-communicable and infectious diseases.

Innovative solutions, including integrated care and better management of chronic diseases, must be part of the answer. As the Business at OECD 5 recommendations to governments show, much can be done to leverage digital health for better sustainability and care integration.

Building a connected ecosystem will require agile policies and new resources, including sophisticated data collection and analytics using Artificial Intelligence to increase our capacity to anticipate, prevent, diagnose, treat and manage population health challenges.

Following up on the second Business at OECD recommendation on health, we are convening together with Sanofi a cross-sector virtual roundtable to discuss how OECD action and stakeholder collaboration can drive greater efficiency and sustainability of health systems, using digital and new technologies in disease prevention and control, including integrated care approaches

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Ulrik KnudsenDeputy Secretary General, OECD

Mr. Ulrik Vestergaard Knudsen took up his duties as Deputy Secretary-General of the OECD in January 2019. His portfolio includes the strategic direction of OECD policy on Science, Technology and Innovation; Employment, Labour and Social Affairs, Migration, Health; Education; and Centre for Entrepreneurship, Small & Medium Enterprises, Regions & Cities.

Until the end of 2018, Mr. Knudsen was Permanent Secretary of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Denmark. In this capacity, he has served numerous Danish Ministers for Foreign Affairs, Development Cooperation, Trade and European Affairs since 2013. Prior to this, he served as Sherpa and Chief Diplomatic Advisor to two Danish Prime Ministers on Security Policy, EU and Foreign Affairs in the Prime Minister's Office.

Mr. Knudsen was appointed Ambassador in 2006. He served as Ambassador to the OECD and UNESCO in Paris (2008-2009). Prior to this, he was Press Officer and Principal Private Secretary to a number of Danish Ministers for Foreign Affairs. Besides his diplomatic career, he briefly served as Group Director for International Policy in Vodafone, London (2013).









Olivier Charmeil
Executive Vice President, General Medicine,
Member of the Sanofi Executive Committee

Olivier Charmeil is a graduate of HEC (Ecole des Hautes Etudes Commerciales) and of the Institut d'Etudes Politiques in Paris. From 1989 to 1994, he worked in the Mergers & Acquisitions department of the European Union Bank.

He joined Sanofi Pharma in 1994 as head of Business Development. Subsequently, he held various positions within Sanofi, including Chief Financial Officer (Asia) of Sanofi-Synthélabo in 1999 and Attaché to the Chairman, Jean-François Dehecq, in 2000, before being appointed as Vice President, Development within the Sanofi-Synthélabo International Operations Directorate, where he was responsible for China and support functions. He was appointed Senior Vice President Asia/Pacific, Pharmaceutical Operations in February 2006. On January 1, 2011, Olivier Charmeil was appointed Executive Vice President Vaccines, and joined the Executive Committee.

From June 2016 to December 2018, Olivier Charmeil served as Executive Vice President of our General Medicines and Emerging Markets Global Business Unit. He took up his current position of Executive Vice President, China and Emerging Markets in January 2019.



Thomas Cueni

Thomas B. Cueni is Director General of International Federation of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers (IFPMA), the global association of research-based pharmaceutical companies and associations.

Mr. Cueni is Secretary of the Biopharmaceutical CEO Roundtable (BCR), a policy forum of the global CEOs of IFPMA member companies. He is also Chair of the Business at OECD Health Committee, and also serves on the Board of Directors of the City Cancer Challenge (CCan), an initiative aiming to improve cancer care in major cities in low- and middle-income countries. In addition, Mr. Cueni serves as Industry Co-Chair of the APEC Biopharmaceutical Working Group on Ethics and Chair of the Board of the cross-sectoral AMR Industry Alliance, a group comprising more than 100 companies and associations representing Rx pharma, generics, biotech, and diagnostics committed to tackling the threat of antimicrobial resistance.

Prior to joining IFPMA he was Secretary General of Interpharma, the association of pharmaceutical research companies in Switzerland, and for many years was a member of the Board and Chair of a key committee of the European Federation of Pharmaceutical Industries and Associations. Mr. Cueni had a career as a journalist, and he served as a Swiss career diplomat with postings in Paris (OECD) and Vienna (IAEA, UNIDO).

Nicole Denjoy is the COCIR Secretary General since 2005 and is based in Brussels. Nicole has gathered more than 35 years of experience in the medical technology industry, working for companies including L'air Liquide, Ohmeda, Boston Scientific and Baxter. Nicole has a Masters in Organisation and Change Management.

Nicole represents COCIR in a variety of influential fora at European Level as well as at international level. Nicole is also Chair of DITTA, the Global Trade Association representing Medical Imaging, Radiation Therapy and Healthcare IT Industry (www.globalditta.org) and leads the DITTA Industry voice in official relationships with WHO since DITTA was granted a NGO status in 2015 and leads the partnership between DITTA and the World Bank since 2016.
